# **Description Of Section**

# **Connection to College Mission**

East Kern Center:

The East Kern Center serves the communities of Edwards Air Force Base, North Edwards, Mojave, Boron, California City and Tehachapi.

The Edwards AFB site offers the Cerro Coso IGETC, CSU Certification, and Local pathways partially online and partially on-ground. Two degrees are available to students at this site: an AA in Liberal Arts: Arts and Humanities, and an AA in Liberal Arts: Social and Behavioral Sciences, which both require online and on-ground coursework. Students in the military can also take courses online and on-ground to complete their general education requirements for an associate degree from the Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) at the Edwards AFB site. This site offers one CTE program, an Emergency Medical Technician certification, which is 100% on-ground at California City High School.

The Tehachapi campus offers the Cerro Coso IGETC, CSU Certification, and Local pathways, as well as associate degrees in Liberal Arts: Arts and Humanities, Liberal Arts: Social and Behavioral Sciences, and Medical Assisting 100% on-ground. Additionally, students can complete an associate degree in Psychology almost entirely on-ground, with the exception of one online course. Available CTE programs at the Tehachapi site include Clinical and Administrative Medical Assisting and Emergency Medical Technician certificates offered 100% on-ground.

East Kern has expanded course offerings at the California City Correctional Facility (CAC) and the California Correctional Institution (Tehachapi). California City Correctional Facility (CAC) site is offering the Cerro Coso and IGETC pathways, as well as an associate degree in Liberal Arts: Social and Behavioral Sciences.

#### Kern River Valley:

Another campus that falls under East Kern's umbrella is the Kern River Valley site. The Kern River Valley (KRV) campus serves the rural communities of Lake Isabella, Wofford Heights, Kernville, Bodfish, Weldon, and Onyx from a facility located in the town of Lake Isabella. In support of the College's mission, KRV provides general, transfer, distance and career technical education programs to ensure that all students are adequately served.

KRV offers the Cerro Coso IGETC and CSU General Education pathways on-ground. KRV also offers a total of eight degrees onground and coursework for 13 other degrees that are offered at least 50% on-ground, with the remaining coursework available online or at the IWV campus. Seven Career Technical Education (CTE) certifications along with four CTE degrees are offered onground to target community needs through the area of workforce development.

East Kern and Kern River Valley:

All sites in the East Kern (South Kern) region offer comprehensive support services on-ground that assist with supporting the institution's instructional programs and overall College mission. These services include the following: Library, Learning Assistance Center, Counseling, Access Programs, Admissions and Records, and Financial aid accessibility. All other student serves are provided online or via the IWV campus.

Overall, of the East Kern campuses embrace and are committed to serving the diverse socioeconomic population of students who reside in the surrounding rural communities by providing outstanding educational, career technical, dual enrollment, prison education, and distance education programs, along with facilitating student success through comprehensive supportive services. This ongoing commitment strives to meet our students' and community's educational and training needs that are in connection with Cerro Coso Community College's primary mission.

# Performance and Equity Gaps Still to be Addressed

### Performance and Equity Gaps that still need to be addressed are the following:

Improve access for the following target populations identified in the college research as experiencing a disproportionate impact: Males, African American, American Indian

Improve course completion for the following target populations identified in the college research as experiencing a disproportionate impact: African American, foster youth, and Pacific Islander

Improve degree and certificate completion for the following target populations identified in the college research as experiencing a disproportionate impact: American Indian, African American, and Males.

Improve transfer for the following target populations identified in the college research as experiencing a disproportionate impact: Low-income students, students with disabilities, African American, and American Indian.

#### Steps being undertaken to address gaps:

**Improve Access** - Communication and the ability to communicate is a major component of access. In East Kern, we have created a Face book page solely to address communication and provide access to students on a technology level. This has received great response. It not only target current students, but provides information and access to potential new students on a daily basis.

Regarding incarcerated students, the only means of communication is via mail correspondence. Student equity has provided the inmate education team with the ability to correspond with incarcerated students by purchasing postage stamps and pre-paid postage envelopes. With the purchase of both, our team have seen an increase in student correspondence, thus impacting student (i.e. Males, African American) access to the college. We are hoping that this support can continue annually so that we can reach and correspond with new and returning students, thus improving the area of access.

**Improve Course Completion** - Text books and the ability to purchase text books both play a major role in all students' ability to complete their courses. Reserve textbooks have been purchased and loaned out at the East Kern campuses to target this performance and equity gap. The cost of these text books can be extremely expensive, and can pose a threat specifically to incarcerated student's success based on their inability to purchase text books. Student equity has provided CCCC's incarcerated students, and specifically African American incarcerated students with the opportunity to check out reserve text books each semester. Each semester, student equity purchased 3-5 text books for each course offered inside the prison. These books consistently assist incarcerated students and provide them with assistance that targets improving their ability to have successful course completion.

Improve degree and certificate completion – Student equity provided the opportunity for CCCC's incarcerated students an opportunity listen and participate in a guest motivational speaker event, given by Odell Bizzell. "Odell Bizzell is a nationally known blogger, speaker, author, internet personality, and expert in training leaders to overcome obstacles to succeed" (http://www.odellbizzell.com/about-odell/) Odell's message emphasized that our incarcerated students are the authors of their own success story, and that goal completion (or degree and certification completion) is more than possible. Overall, this message help give aid to larger issues that faces numerous students, which is retention and student success.

**Improve transfer -** East Kern campuses have worked with the Director of Student Outreach, Director of Student Equity, and the counseling department to offer opportunities and experiences to promote and improve transfer. Student Development funds have played a major role in the ability to host guest speakers and offer transfer informational events on the campuses. Also, East Kern campuses invite Universities (UC, CSU, and Private Universities) to host informational booths so that students can gain more awareness regarding transfer.

# **Annual Planning: Actions Taken**

# Expand Dual-Enrollment and Concurrent Enrollment in East Kern

East Kern College Center is now offering dual enrollment courses in the following high school districts: Mojave Unified School District and Tehachapi Unified High School District. East Kern has the largest dual enrollment course offering/program with Cerro Coso Community College.

East Kern met the goal of expansion by adding course offerings at the two above high school districts by a minimum of 2 classes in the fall 2016 semester and 2 classes in the spring 2017 semester.

East Kern expanded and began to offer dual enrollment classes at Muroc High School District, including offering 2 courses at Boron High School during the fall 2016 semester.

East Kern has built a partnership/relationship with East Kern high school home schools (i.e. Mojave River, Hope Academy, & Valley Oak), and is now providing concurrent enrollment opportunities with these students.

## Growth and Expansion of East Kern

There has been growth and expansion in East Kern during the 2017-2018. Enrollment and FTES has continue to grow, with East Kern coming in at 200 FTES during the fall 2017. This FTES number is larger than the campuses of Mammoth, Bishop, and Kern River Valley site combined. The 2018- 2023 Educational Master Plan specifically states, ""The Tehachapi Campus is perhaps the fastest growing Cerro Coso Community College Center."

The prison education program has grown and continued to grow. We met the lead goal of growing 25% and doubled that number. The prison education program is not only in California City Prison, but has grown and is in four facilities within CCI Tehachapi prison. The upcoming semester will show CCCC providing 57 courses in both prisons, doubling the amount of course offerings the previous semester. Due to the continued growth, this initiative was listed as in progress.

California City – With the new potential growth in California City (marijuana industry), the need for BSIS skilled training for security guards (new program) is being requested. We were unable to start this program during the last academic year, but this program is being listed as a need in this upcoming section plan. This status is shown as in progress.

CCCC' relationship with Tehachapi High School District and their Adult Education program has grown and expanded. Our partnership is strong and students are referred to the appropriate educational partner depending on the student's need. This status is shown as completed.

East Kern was able to acquire a few computers the development of a "start-up" Learning Resource Center/Learning Assistance Center at the Tehachapi site. The Learning Assistance (LAC) Tech increase of 10 hours per week request to recruit tutors, and grow the LAC in Tehachapi was denied; therefore, has affected the ability to complete this initiative. Also, East Kern Tehachapi does not have enough space for anymore growth, and the need for a larger facility will have to be looked at very soon to provide this service to students.

The East Kern Campus manager position increase was denied, and that position remained 11 months/40 hours per week.

## **Dual-Enrollment Expansion**

Discussions are currently being completed with Kern High School District (Kern Valley High School) and Cerro Coso Community College to expand and begin offering dual enrollment mathematics courses and personal development courses.

Kern River Valley expanded the dual enrollment program with a new high school partner. This new partnership was with Delano High School District. There was a voiced need for medical assisting courses/program in Delano. Currently, Bakersfield College does not offer this program; therefore, CCCC was given permission to begin offering dual enrollment courses in three high schools in the Delano High School District. The first semester that courses were offered was in fall 2017. CCCC was able to offer multiple courses which provided 80 students with dual enrollment coursework opportunities in the Medical Assisting (Administrative) CTE field. This program will continue with the goal of high school students received an Administrative Medical Assisting Certificate prior to or by the time they graduate from high school.

## Kern River Valley Campus Remodel Project

The Kern River Valley remodel project has not started, but is listed as in progress. With the passing of Measure J, there is now complete funding to complete this project, and the hope is that it will be completed during the 2018-2019 academic year.

# **Career Technical Education (CTE) Expansion Initiative**

#### Lead Measure of Success:

#### Community Outreach Survey

a. A community outreach survey was initially given to residents in the Tehachapi community beginning in fall 2017. Out of 34 respondents, when asked what were some of the reasons preventing enrollment in courses at Tehachapi, 17% indicated class format as a barrier and of those, 80% preferred "onsite" classes and 20% preferred a hybrid of online-onsite. Out of all survey respondents, only one selected "online" as being the preferred method of instruction. Most prefer onsite classes (67%) or hybrid (30%). Another frequent response was that they were not interested in the courses, programs or certificates offered (17%).

b. When asked which CTE courses they would be interested in studying, the most frequent responses were Nursing (27%), Computer Science (23%), Administration of Justice (20%), and Human Services (17%) followed by Welding (13%), Cyber Security (13%), Business Service Office Technology (13%), and Agriculture & Natural Resources (13%). Twenty-percent of respondents selected "None of the above" as an option when asked which CTE programs they'd be interested in studying.

As a "lead" measure, the community outreach survey is used as early observational data to understand the needs of the community. During implementation of the initiative, community feedback along with local and regional employer support will be assessed for sustainable interest in developing future CTE programs.

2. Priority areas as identified by the Centers of Excellence for the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office will be assessed for gaps between expanding occupations and degree and award fulfillment in our Southern Central Valley region.

# Facilities

## EAST KERN:

#### 1. Request and Justification for the Purchase of a Permanent Tehachapi Campus:

With the passage of a bond during the 2016 election, East Kern would like to state not only the desire but need for a future permanent campus/site in the City of Tehachapi.

#### **Measure J Bond**

Measure J specifically calls out (under description of facilities) that, "The Facilities to be finance by the Improvement District include the acquisition, construction, repair, upgrading, and equipping of classrooms, property, sites and community college facilities through the Improvement District. Project costs include the costs of design, planning, environmental review and remediation, and any secondary effects costs."

Even though the acquisition of a campus Tehachapi was not listed in the initial CCCC "Project List," the bond states, "Bond proceeds shall only be expended for the specific purposes identified herein," thus not (just) the specific project list. Exhibit A and Exhibit B describe the specific purposes of the bond (i.e. acquiring facilities, sites, assist veterans, etc.).

With the site's continued growth and expansion, this request can become a reality. Also, the need for this request was noted in CCCC's Educational Master Plan that is currently being proposed.

#### Educational Master Plan Statement (targeting campus request) 2018-2023

"The Tehachapi Campus is perhaps the fastest growing Cerro Coso Community College Center. As mentioned above, the City of Tehachapi is the 10th fastest growing retail market in the state of California. This is most certainly a positive economic indicator for the Center and for Cerro Coso Community College as a whole. The city is also home to one of the world's largest producers of wind-generated electricity. The Tehachapi Campus ESA 2016 population is 41,714 and growing to 43,453 for 2021. In general, this Center has the most progressive and substantial financial indicators than the other East Kern Valley ESA."

Creating "Complete Campuses": "As a companion to encouraging / incentivizing student to take greater class loads, the College should strive to create complete campuses" at each location. This applies, particularly, to the outlying campuses. At present, there is an overall imbalance of space across the campuses i.e. a plethora of space at one campus and little or no space at another. If there is an effort to encourage students to take greater course loads, there should be facilities present on the campus that support and that effort – i.e. make the campus a place where student want to be. The "complete campus" concept also extends to the provision of course offerings that facilitate students achieving their respective educational missions. "

The Campus' Capacity for Growth - Data: "When the last Educational Master Plan 2012 was completed, the annual East Kern Center student enrollment growth rate was projected to be 5.2% on annual basis over the period 2010 to 2015; WSCH was projected to grow at 3.2% annually over that same period. The actual annual rate of student enrollment growth outperformed this projection; it averaged 51.0% on an annual basis. The generation of WSCH at the East Kern Center also exceeded the projections from the last Educational Master Plan with an annual average growth rate of 31.9% from 2010 to 2015. The growth rates for both student enrollment and WSCH were skewed by the addition of the Tehachapi Campus in 2015. This impact needs to considered in the future capacity for growth at the East Kern Center."

Projected Cost to purchase a campus (including classroom furniture and renovation if required) – \$800,000.00 (Looking at Measure J to fund majority of project)

#### 2. Library AUP Connection:

The Tehachapi site aligns with the Library AUP's request for a locking file cabinet. The Tehachapi site does not have a locking cabinet that can house reserve textbooks.

#### 3. Campus Requests:

As the campus continues to grow and expand, with traditional, non-traditional, and special populations (i.e. dual enrollment and incarcerated students), the need for additional furniture for students, faculty and staff is required. The campus is expanding, and with that expansion comes a need for a student lounge space/furniture, learning assistance space/furniture, the ability and capacity for storage, and other misc. items required to run a campus smoothly. Lastly, when additional full-time faculty are hired for East Kern, they must have a designated space (i.e. cubical, desk, etc.).

Tehachapi currently does not have ITV capability; therefore, web cams would be used in lieu of this technology so that faculty, staff and students can be more engaged during meetings. At this time, meetings are being participated via telephone. We were currently allotted two web cams, which are not enough for the volume.

#### 2. Desktop & Monitor Request (requesting 3 of each)

East Kern/Tehachapi is requesting a desktop computer and monitor for the full time Educational Advisor, full time Anthropology faculty/instructor, and Director/Campus Manager at the Tehachapi campus. The Educational Advisor and full time Anthropology faculty member are both currently using a laptop that was assigned for the campus use; thus, the laptop cannot be accessed or

used by students as intended. The Director and Campus Manager are using student computer stations. The Educational Advisor computer request aligns with the Counseling AUP 2017-2018 technology plan request.

### 3. Laptops - Prison Faculty (requesting 10 laptops)

Request for 10 (basic) laptops – These laptops will be used by faculty teaching at California City Prison and Tehachapi Prison. These two prison campuses are growing; therefore, the need for technology equipment is growing to assist with instruction. At this time, Cerro Coso Community College faculty is providing instruction to more than 700 students. California City Prison has smart boards in every classroom, and the only way that faculty can access this smart board is bringing a assigned laptop into the prison.

#### 4. Media Cart (requesting 3 additional media carts)

The Tehachapi campus currently utilizes five classrooms. Technology is a necessity for faculty in order to meet their curriculum and student learning outcome goals for each course. Every semester, all faculty request the use of a media cart, but based on the very limited number of carts (i.e. only two), many faculty go without the use of technology. Additional Media Carts are necessary for most professor's curriculum. Also, the need for the technology in each room is necessary as the technological issues that are continual could be avoided. Lastly, at all other Cerro Coso Community College campus locations, technology (either via media cart or smart rooms) is a tool that is provided to all faculty to help assist with student learning and success.

• Projected Cost - \$3000.00

#### 5. ITV Equipment request for Tehachapi Campus (Measure J)

In order to grow and expand the Tehachapi site, ITV equipment is being requested. ITV will allow classes to be taught via ITV, thus increasing enrollment and providing student's opportunities to take classes that are not physically located at the campus. In the future, there is a potential for a LVN program coming to the Tehachapi site; therefore, ITV equipment will be a required need. It will also enable face to face participation (via ITV) for students, faculty and staff during meetings, etc.

Projected Cost: Unknown

#### 6. 6 Updated Phones (Shoretel) or 3 Additional 4 Line ATT 1080 Phones

An updated phone system is a need (not a want) in order to provide the Tehachapi site staff, and specifically student's direct access to campus and the resources available. This also fulfills CCCC's Mission of providing, "... equitable services to the students in the communities and rural areas we serve (CCCC's Mission Statement). A total of six phones are being requested. Each phone would provide each office a designated line, as well the ability to create a financial aid direct access phone to assist with daily student questions, challenges, and needs.

## 7. 2 Flat Screen TV's

2 flat screen televisions are being requested for the campus. All other campuses (i.e. IWV, Bishop, and Mammoth) have this technology item available to reach students with student services information, messages, campus activities, etc. Additionally, the televisions would allow also students connection with main campus as to see updates, events, along with additionally help us advertise on campus. Lastly, the flat screen televisions would be strategically placed in the student lounge and inside the main CCCCC area.

• Projected cost: \$1500.00

#### Justification:

This request is to ask for reassigning a .1 load for a full-time faculty member in Letters and Sciences and a .1 load for a full-time faculty member in CTE to act as co-coordinators and champions of the incarcerated student education program. Currently, there is a no dedicated faculty ownership within this program. Moving forward, in order for this program to grow and remain sustainable, there is a great need for faculty involvement (from both the Letters and Sciences and CTE areas) to assist with planning, analysis, identification of gaps, faculty support, and overall program review/evaluations. Currently, CCCC's incarcerated student education program is #2 in the nation in regards to size and course offerings. Providing this reassigned time and a multi-year commitment to co-coordinators will assist with the growth and sustainability of this growing and thriving program. Overall, this requests targets the college's commitment to the mission and ACCJC standards (III and IV).

Below are a few identified (potential) responsibilities of the co-coordinators reassigned time:

- Adjunct coordination and review (possibly evaluation assistance)
- Adjunct hiring process/partner and recruiting
